Description

It is estimated that up to 4.4 million low-income beneficiaries are eligible for, but not receiving, low-income subsidies under the Medicare Part D prescription drug benefit. Many older Americans are eligible for, but not receiving federal and state benefits ranging from income supplements to energy assistance to health care assistance. In recognition of this need, in 2006, the OAA was amended with language directing AoA to provide technical assistance to States, Area Agencies on Aging, and service providers to carry out outreach and benefits enrollment assistance, particularly to older individuals with greatest economic need, for Federal and State programs providing benefits including: (i) Supplemental Security Income benefits under title XVI of the Social Security Act; (ii) Medical Assistance under title XIX of the Social Security Act; (iii) Benefits under the Food Stamp Act of 1977; or (iv) Benefits under other applicable programs. Further, in reauthorizing the Act Congress directed AoA to work with an experienced entity to establish a National Center on Senior Benefits Outreach and Enrollment to: (i) Maintain and update web-based decision support and enrollment tools and integrated, person-centered systems designed to inform older individuals about the full range of benefits for which the individuals may be eligible under Federal and State programs; (ii) Utilize cost-effective strategies to find older individuals with greatest economic need and enroll the individuals in the programs for which they are qualified; (iii) Create and support efforts for Aging and Disability Resource Centers (ADRCs), and other public and private State and community-based organizations, including faith-based organizations and coalitions,

to serve as benefits enrollment centers for the programs; (iv) Develop and maintain an information clearinghouse on best practices and cost-effective methods for finding and enrolling older individuals with greatest economic need in the programs for which the individuals are eligible; and (v) Provide, in collaboration with related Federal agency partners administering the Federal programs, training and technical assistance on effective outreach, screening, enrollment, and follow-up strategies.

Eligible Applicants

In order to ensure that the SMP program message is integrated throughout the State aging network, eligibility for application is limited to State Units on Aging (SUA). The Administration on Aging (AoA) envisions the SMP program as the nationally recognized leader in prevention and identification of fraud and abuse in health care programs that affect the lives of elderly consumers. To achieve this vision, AoA has developed SMP Strategic Program Objectives. Objective #1, Foster national and statewide program coverage, requires that AoA maximize opportunities to expand the capacity of SMP

Projects to reach every elder consumer in each state. Strategic Objective #5, Target training and education to isolated and hard-to-reach populations requires that AoA target SMP outreach efforts to include those traditionally hardest to reach those in rural, and tribal areas of the state. The SUA is responsible for ensuring that aging program networks exist to reach all elderly individuals with information, assistance and program support. In particular, the SUA is uniquely positioned to ensure that the SMP message of health care prevention and identification, reaches into every corner of the state. This statewide leadership role of the SUA, in collaboration with the SMP and a variety of other partners, will expand the SMP program capacity and develop model approaches to overcome barriers to reaching elders that are hardest to serve due to their isolation and limited accessibility.

Description

Since 1997 the Senior Medicare Patrol Projects (SMP) have been AoA's primary vehicle to conduct health care fraud control outreach and education for Medicare/Medicaid beneficiaries. Retired professionals are recruited as volunteers to conduct community based training activities designed to increase awareness of vulnerable older consumers. As a result, consumers are empowered to protect themselves and take action to report suspicious activities, thereby decreasing costly billing errors, fraud and avoiding unnecessary medical interventions. In 2004, SMP Integration Grants were first awarded to 14 existing SMP projects for a two- year period, to develop new partnerships or "cutting edge" approaches to improve outreach efforts. AoA identified three priority areas for collaboration and program integration, including: Medicaid fraud, home health care fraud, and fraud related to the new prescription drug benefits under the Medicare Modernization Act. In 2006, 15 two-year awards were made to grantees who demonstrated how their proposals would strengthen the SMP program through the integration of SMP program materials, outreach and message to: 1) reach targeted populations; and 2) address targeted areas of health care fraud, error or abuse. Under this competition, AoA plans to further expand and integrate the SMP fraud awareness message throughout rural areas through collaborative efforts led by the state aging organization. Up to nine (9) cooperative agreements will be funded at a federal share of \$100,000 per year and a project period of up to two years under this announcement. The award is a cooperative agreement because the Administration on Aging will be substantially involved in the development and implementation of the activities of the projects and will describe the technical assistance, support, and training to be provided to the projects. The cooperative agreements will provide expectations for: project activities, development and dissemination of models, and evaluation of the project; as well as detail substantial assistance and support to be provided by AoA and the National Consumer Protection Technical Resource Center (the Center). Applicants are required to cover at least 25% of the total program costs with non-Federal resources. The full text of the announcement includes a description of the priority areas and all the instructions necessary to prepare and submit a grant proposal to compete for the SMP Integration Grant awards. Competition for this funding opportunity is limited to State Units on Aging (SUA) as defined by the Older American Act (OAA) of 2006.

Eligible Applicants

Eligible applicants are members of the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline crisis center network who provide 24 hour day coverage and meet the additional eligibility requirements described in 3.2. Only crisis centers participating in the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline are able to obtain consent and provide follow up to National Suicide Prevention lifeline callers who experienced suicidal thoughts during or immediately preceding the call to the Lifeline. In order to maximize the likelihood of developing successful follow up approaches with this population of high risk callers , eligible National Suicide Prevention Lifeline crisis centers must have experience working with NSPL initiatives focusing on high risk, high priority or underserved populations. These include crisis centers functioning as back up centers for the NSPL Veterans initiative, crisis centers participating in the NSPL Native American pilot initiative, crisis centers participating as part of the Spanish language sub network who provide 24 hour Spanish language coverage, and crisis centers who are currently through an existing contractual relationship with a State Mental Health Authority providing services to a state or region within a state. These limitations on eligibility are required, given the at risk nature of the population to be served, to assure that the necessary infrastructure is in place to provide

services to these high risk, high priority or underserved populations, and to assure that relationships with State/local mental health systems are in place to assure that caller follow up and access to care can take place to meet the requirements of these cooperative agreements.

Description

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, Center for Mental Health Services is accepting applications for fiscal year (FY) 2008 National Suicide Prevention Lifeline Crisis Center Follow Up grants. The purpose of this program is to promote systematic follow up of suicidal persons who call the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline. Every month, almost 44,000 calls are answered through the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline. While not every caller is at acute risk for suicide, past SAMHSA-funded hotline evaluations have shown that large numbers of callers have significant histories of suicidal ideation and attempts. Crisis centers provide invaluable services and for those at imminent risk for suicide, emergency intervention is frequently initiated and may result in a psychiatric hospitalization or other acute mental health service provision. For those not at imminent risk, crisis hotlines will typically provide referrals to mental health and other services, and will also advise the caller that they may call back if they are in crisis or have additional needs. While the SAMHSA evaluations demonstrated that callers experienced a reduction in hopelessness and suicidal intent, the evaluation also showed that 43% of suicidal callers experienced some recurrence of suicidal ideation within the next several weeks. This recurrence of suicidal thinking underscores the importance of receiving follow up behavioral healthcare or other appropriate services or interventions. However, the hotline evaluations found that only a minority of suicidal callers set up an appointment. Upon follow up, only 22.5% of suicidal callers had been seen by the behavioral health care system to which they had been referred and an additional 12.6% had an appointment scheduled but had not yet been seen. Clearly there is a critical need to promote more systematic follow up of callers at risk of suicide. The Cooperative Agreements National Suicide Prevention Lifeline Crisis Center Follow Up is one of SAMHSA's services grant programs. SAMHSA's services grants are designed to address gaps in mental health prevention and treatment services. SAMHSA intends that its services grants result in the delivery of services as soon as possible after award. Service delivery should begin by the 4th month of the project at the latest. National Suicide Prevention Lifeline Crisis Center Follow Up grants are authorized under Section 520A of the Public Health Service Act, as amended. This announcement addresses Healthy People 2010 focus area 18 (Mental Health and Mental Disorders).
